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Congressional Freshmen to Include Largest Veteran Cohort Since 2010

Iraq & Afghanistan Veterans, Women Veterans Taking on an Outsized Role

SAN FRANCISCO (November 7, 2018) --The University of San Francisco (USF) and Veterans Campaign have been tracking congressional candidates with military experience and are releasing the following post-election analysis. A detailed biennial "Field Report" will be published later in the fall. "We have just elected to Congress a record number of new Iraq and Afghanistan veterans, while witnessing the largest influx ever of women veterans," said Seth Lynn, founder of Veterans Campaign and director of the USF Master of Arts in Public Leadership program. "What we are seeing today is the torch being passed to the post-9/11 generation of veterans."

USF recently partnered with Veterans Campaign to launch its online MA in Public Leadership, which is designed to both prepare students to run for elective office and for careers in legislative affairs, campaign management, advocacy and civic leadership. The program is focused on military veterans and family members, but is open to anyone committed to learning the skills needed to serve the public good.

Seth Lynn, the founder of Veterans Campaign and director of the USF MA in Public Leadership program, is available to answer questions and provide analysis.

Updates in undecided races

The following races had not been called by the AP as of the morning after the election. Winners are in bold. Of note, Jeff Denham (R-CA), Steve Knight (R-CA), and Martha McSally (R-AZ) have lost after initially leading. Jared Golden (D-ME) and Gil Cisneros (D-CA), both initially trailing, have now been declared the winners.

Barring any unforeseen changes, we should expect (77) veterans in the House - (18) of them newly elected - and (18) in the Senate this January - the same number as are currently serving, though still fewer than were serving at the beginning of the term. The text below this table <u>has not</u> been updated to reflect these status changes.

Summary of Initial Findings

At least (16) newly-elected veterans will join the 116th House of Representatives

- This is the most freshmen with military experience since 2010; there were (14) in 2016 and (12) in 2012 and 2014
- As of this writing there are (6) additional non-incumbent veterans whose races have not been called by the Associated Press; however, they are all currently behind in the vote count

At least (9) new Iraq and Afghanistan veterans will join the House of Representatives

- This is the largest such influx since those two conflicts began
- By comparison, (6) were elected in 2014 and (7) were elected in 2016

At least (3) women vets will join the House, the largest such increase ever

- Elaine Luria (D-VA), Chrissy Houlahan (D-PA), and Mikie Sherrill (D-NJ) have won seats in the House of Representatives; Tulsi Gabbard (D-HI) was reelected
- If Martha McSally (R-AZ) maintains the lead in her Senate race, she will join Joni Ernst (R-IA) and Tammy Duckworth (D-IL), meaning at least (7) women vets in the next Congress - the largest number ever
- An additional (2) women vets, Gina Ortiz Jones (D-TX) and Wendy Rogers (R-AZ) are trailing in races that the AP has yet to call
- This influx of women veterans in Congress is especially striking when considering that before 2012 only (3) women veterans had ever been elected to Congress
- Amy McGrath (D-KY) and Mary Jennings Hegar (D-TX) both came within 3 percentage points of winning, despite running in districts Donald Trump carried by double digits
- A total of (12) women veterans earned major party nominations the highest number ever

At least (78) veterans are likely to serve in the 116th House of Representatives¹

- This will be a slight increase from the (77) veterans currently serving but is likely to be a slight *decrease* from the (82) serving when the 115th Congress took office²
- Excluding undecided races, the partisan breakdown of House veterans will be (22) Democrats and (55) Republicans, (3) more veteran Democrats and (6) fewer veteran Republicans than at the beginning of the current term
- Of the (77) veterans currently serving, (11) did not run for reelection and Mark Sanford (R-SC) was defeated in the primary
- Of the (65) incumbent veterans who ran for reelection, (3) were defeated: Scott Taylor (R-VA), Steve Russell (R-OK), and Mike Coffman (R-CO); (3) more are currently leading in undecided races: Jeff Denham (R-CA), Steve Knight (R-CA), and Duncan Hunter (R-CA)
- (159) veterans received a major party nomination in 2018, about the same number that received a nomination in 2014 (162) and 2016 (160)³

¹ This (78) includes (3) incumbents who are currently leading but whose races have not yet been called by the AP. It does not include (6) challengers trailing in undecided races. One of the (78) will be a non-voting delegate: incumbent Gregorio Kilili Sablan and his opponent, Angel Demapan, are both Army veterans. However, the election has been postponed due to a recent typhoon.
² Unless at least five of the veterans currently trailing in undecided races end up ahead.

³ This figure does not include candidates from Louisiana (who do not receive nominations) or nominees in non-voting delegate races. However, veterans who win these races are included in our count of veterans in Congress. Third party candidates are counted as major party nominees if they advance to the general election in states with "jungle primaries." This year there was one such veteran candidate: Ron Kabat (I-CA).

About (19) veterans will serve in the next Senate⁴

- This would be a slight increase from the (18) veterans currently serving but a slight *decrease* from the (21) serving when the current term began
- (15) veteran incumbents did not face reelection this year
- (2) veteran incumbents were reelected: Tom Carper (D-DE) and Roger Wicker (R-MS)
- (1) veteran incumbent, Bill Nelson (D-FL), is currently trailing fellow veteran Rick Scott (R-FL) in an undecided race
- (1) non-incumbent veteran, Martha McSally (R-AZ), is currently ahead in an undecided race

Non-incumbent Democratic veterans faced much tougher House races

- Democratic challengers with military experience were nominated in districts that Trump won by an average of 21 percent; by comparison, Democratic challengers without military experience were nominated in districts Trump won by just 14 percent
- Republican challengers were in the opposite situation: nominees with military experience faced districts Clinton won by about 13 percent, while those *without* military experience ran in districts that went to Clinton by an average of nearly 22 percent
